First Annual High School Championship

IT WAS EERILY QUIET AT THE BURLINGAME BRIDGE CLUB since there was a game in progress. Four teams of players representing four different schools

were competing to be named 2015's Bay Area High School Bridge Champions. Concentration showed on the faces of the players as each considered what bids to make and what cards to play. In the end the Monta Vista High School Matadors emerged victorious. The Matadors team were Dan Zhukov (captain), grade 11, Cameron Wheeler, grade 9, Sophie Lian, grade 9, and Aidan Gottlieb, grade 10. The runners up were the Paly High School Vikings, followed by Gunn High School and Galileo High School. Playing for Galileo were Marcus Hong, Steven Jiang, Daniel Han, and David Fang. Lowell High School was not able to field a team due to a conflict with their senior prom.

The competition was run in two parts. The first part was a round robin swiss teams. The two teams who ranked first and second in the swiss then played a head to head match to name the victor. At the end of the swiss, Vikings were slightly ahead of the Matadors and had a small carry-over going into the final. But the Matadors overcame that advantage in the head-to-head compe-
